Privacy Notice

Introduction

As a school we collect a significant amount of information about our pupils. This notice explains why we collect the information, how we use it, the type of information we collect and our lawful reasons for doing so.

Under the General Data Protection Regulation (May 2018), individuals have a right to be informed about how the school uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing 'privacy notices' to individuals where we are processing their personal data.

We, Conifers Primary School, Radipole Lane, Weymouth DT4 OQF are the 'data controller' for the purposes of data protection law. Our Data Protection Officer (DPO) monitors our compliance with the General Data Protection Regulation and acts as the point of contact for data subjects and the Information Commissioner's Office. Our DPO contact details are at the end of this document.

Why do we collect data?

We collect and use the pupil data to:

Our Legal Obligations

We must make sure that information we collect and use about pupils is in line with the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). This means that we must have a lawful reason to collect the data, and that if we share that with another organisation or individual we must have a legal basis to do so.

The lawful basis for schools to collect information comes from a variety of sources, such as the Education Act 1996, Regulation 5 of The Education Information About Individual Pupils (England) Regulations 2013, Article 6 and Article 9 of the GDPR.

The Department for Education and Local Authorities require us to collect certain information and report back to them. This is called a 'public task' and is recognised in law as it is necessary to provide the information.

We also have obligations to collect data about children who are at risk of suffering harm, and to share that with other agencies that have a responsibility to safeguard children, such as the police and social care.

We also share information about pupils who may need or have an Education Health and Care Plan (or Statement of Special Educational Needs). Medical teams have access to some information about pupils, either by agreement or because the law says we must share that information, for example school nurses may visit the school.

Counselling services, careers services, occupational therapists are the type of people we will share information, so long as we have consent or are required by law to do so.

We must keep up to date information about parents and carers for emergency contacts.

How we use the data

In school we also use various third-party tools to make sure that pupils' best interests are met. We also record details about progress, attainment and pupil development to support future planning and learning.

We use software to track progress and attainment currently the third party software we use for this purpose is:

Tapestry (Foundation Stage Forum l	Ltd).

We use data to manage and monitor pastoral needs and attendance/absences so that suitable strategies can be planned if required. The third Party software we use for this purpose is as follows:

We use systems to take electronic payments for school meals and some other services:

We use financial software to manage school budgets, which may include some pupil data. For this purpose we use:

We also use contact information to keep pupils, parents, carers up to date about school events. The software we use for this purpose is:

We may use data to provide children with access to educational services and websites such as:

Micro Librarian (Micro Librarian Systems)

Data can be used to monitor school effectiveness, the impact of intervention and learning styles across groups of pupils as well as individual children.

We may use consultants, experts and other advisors to assist the school in fulfilling its obligations and to help run the school properly. We might need to share pupil information with them if this is relevant to their work.

Where we transfer personal data to a country or territory outside the European Economic Area, we will do so in accordance with data protection law.

What type of data is collected?

The DfE and government require us to collect a lot of data by law, so that they can monitor and support schools more widely, as well as checking on individual schools' effectiveness. The categories of pupil information that the school collects, holds and shares include the following:

lacksquare Personal information - e.g. names, pupil numbers, addresses, contact details,
contact preferences, date of birth, identification documents
lacksquare Characteristics – e.g. ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth and free
school meal eligibility, Pupil Premium
Attendance information – e.g. number of absences and absence reasons
Assessment information – e.g. national curriculum assessment results
Exclusion information
Relevant medical information, including physical and mental health
☐ Safeguarding information
Details of any support received, including care packages, plans and support
providers
Information relating to SEND and health needs
Behavioural information – e.g. number of temporary exclusions
CCTV, photos and video recordings of you are also personal information

We may also hold data about pupils that we have received from other organisations, including other schools, local authorities and the Department for Education.

Storing pupil data

Conifers Primary keeps information about you on computer systems and also sometimes on paper. We hold your education records securely until you change school. Your records will then be transferred to your new school, where they will be retained until you reach the age of 25, after which they are safely destroyed.

Who we share pupil information with

We do not share information about pupils with any third party without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

Collecting pupil information

Whilst the majority of pupil information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it is provided to us on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the General Data Protection Regulation, we will inform you whether you are required to provide certain pupil information to us or if you have a choice in this.

Why we share pupil information

We do not share information about our pupils with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

We share pupils' data with the Department for Education (DfE) on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins school funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring.

Data collection requirements

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department. It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

We are required by law, to provide information about our pupils to the DfE as part of statutory data collections such as the School Census and Early Years Census. Some of this information is then stored in the NPD. The law that allows this is the Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

The department may share information about our pupils from the NPD with third parties who promote the education or well-being of children in England by:

conducting research or analysisproducing statisticsproviding information, advice or guidance

The Department has robust processes in place to ensure the confidentiality of our data is maintained and there are stringent controls in place regarding access and use of the data. Decisions on whether DfE releases data to third parties are subject to a strict approval process and based on a detailed assessment of:

who is requesting the data
the purpose for which it is required
the level and sensitivity of data requested: and
the arrangements in place to store and handle the data

To be granted access to pupil information, organisations must comply with strict terms and conditions covering the confidentiality and handling of the data, security arrangements and retention and use of the data.

Requesting access to your personal data

Under data protection legislation, parents and pupils have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child's educational record, contact our Data Protection Officer (see 'Contact' details at end of document).

Individuals have a right to make a 'subject access request' to gain access to personal information that the school holds about them.

Parents/carers can make a request with respect to their child's data where the child is not considered mature enough to understand their rights over their own data (usually under the age of 12), or where the child has provided consent. Parents also have the right to make a subject access request with respect to any personal data the school holds about them.

If you make a subject access request, and if we do hold information about you or your child, we will:

🛮 Give you a description of it
Tell you why we are holding and processing it, and how long we will keep it for
Explain where we got it from, if not from you or your child
🛮 Tell you who it has been, or will be, shared with
Let you know whether any automated decision-making is being applied to the
data, and any consequences of this
🛮 Give you a copy of the information in an intelligible form

Individuals also have the right for their personal information to be transmitted electronically to another organisation in certain circumstances.

Parents/carers also have a legal right to access to their child's educational record. To request access to your child's records please contact the school office on 01305 771289.

You also have the right to:
oxdot object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing,
damage or distress
Derevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
object to decisions being taken by automated means
oxdot in certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked,
erased or destroyed; and
oxdot claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the Data Protection
regulations
